

How ChessKid Coaches Can Help Young Players





Background

This case study shows how a young player was helped by a ChessKid coach who motivated the student to grow in their knowledge of chess.

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Overview

Student: Emerson, a 10-year-old in the fourth grade

Skill level: Beginner

Coach: Nick Matta, one of the coaches approved by ChessKid

Challenges

- Self-learners are motivated but often have serious gaps in understanding chess that hinders progress.
- Young players are easily distracted and can become unmotivated to spend regular time necessary to progress.
- Parents can be unsure what is needed to prepare for a tournament.



Solutions

- After the student wanted to take their game to the next level, the parent arranged for one-on-one lessons with a ChessKid coach.
- The ChessKid coach analyzed the student's current chess ability based on goals, skill level, and age. The coach then set up goals, expectations, and schedules.
- ChessKid's coaching goes beyond learning chess to also help a young learner believe in themselves.



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Results

- The student was motivated with the levels of performance that can be achieved on ChessKid (and collected 15,000 stars).
- After learning the basics of chess, the student entered his first tournament and almost won it. He placed second among almost 50 fourth- and fifth-grade students. Then he went undefeated in the Texas State Championships and won his division.
- The ChessKid coach working with the student has generated new excitement and motivated the student to study more and play well.



Emerson went 7-0 and won his division in the Texas State Championships.
